Delegates to Frame Constitution to Be Chosen Sept. 15.

WILL MEET IN NOVEMBER.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—The War Department today promulgated an order fixing the time of holding the Cuban elections for the selection of delegates to the constitutional convention. The order says:

"Whereas, the people of Cuba are now ready to proceed to the establishment of a general government which shall assume and exercise sovereignty, jurisdiction and control over the island.

"Therefore, it is ordered that a general election be held in the island of Cuba on the third Saturday of September, in the year 1900, to elect delegates to a convention to meet in the city of Havana, at 12 o'clock noon, on the first Monday of No-

o'clock noon, on the first Monday of November, in the year 1900, to frame and adopt a constitution for the people of Cuba, and as a part thereof to provide for and agree with the government of the United States upon the relations to exist between that government and the government of Cuba, and to provide for the election by the people of officers under such constitution and the transfer of government to the officers so elected."

The people of the several provinces will elect delegates in number proportioned to their populations as determined by the census, viz.: Pinar Del Rio, 3 delegates; Havana, 8; Matanzas, 4; Banta Clara, 7; Puerto Principe, 2; Santiago, 7.
